COURSE DESCRIPTION

Rules of law govern many aspects of business. An understanding of legal rules and ethical constraints provides a framework for making sound business decisions, facilitates commercial transactions, and promotes order in the marketplace.

This course focuses on the organization and operation of the American legal system, legal rules and ethical guidelines that impact business, and the practical application of these rules/guidelines to real-life situations. Emphasis is placed on analytical problem solving and ethical decision making.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Our study of the legal and ethical environment of business is designed to help students accomplish the following objectives:

- (1) Recognize legal and ethical issues when making business decisions.
- (2) Gain an enhanced understanding of legal rules and ethical constraints.
- (3) Improve analytical problem solving and ethical decision making skills.
- (4) Apply knowledge and skills to address and manage potential problems before they become actual, expensive problems.
- (5) Evaluate expert advice and determine the extent to which it should be incorporated into business decisions.

Exams are <u>open-book and open-note</u>, testing your ability to analyze hypothetical situations and determine the extent to which various legal rules and ethical constraints apply. There are <u>no make-up exams</u>. If you miss <u>either</u> exam #1 <u>or</u> exam #2 for any reason, the percentage assigned to the exam you have missed will be applied to the final exam. Therefore, if you miss exam #1, your final exam will be worth 65% of your overall grade. If you miss exam #2, your final exam will be worth 75% of your final grade. If you miss <u>both</u> exam #1 <u>and</u> exam #2, the percentage assigned to exam #1 will be applied to the final exam (your final exam will be worth 65% of your overall grade), and you will receive a zero on exam #2 (worth 35% of your overall grade). <u>Dropping an exam grade is not an option</u> in this course. Once you have taken an exam, the score earned is factored into your overall grade.
